Dear friends,

Greetings on this Whitsunday! Rudolf Steiner referred to Whitsun as the Festival of united Soul-Endeavor as well as the festival of the Free Individuality. 50 days after Easter, Whitsun, or Pentecost, marks the descent of the Holy Spirit upon the apostles in tongues of flame:

When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. And suddenly a sound came from heaven like the rush of a mighty wind, and it filled all the house where they were sitting. And there appeared to them tongues as of fire, distributed and resting on each one of them. And they were all filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other tongues, as the Spirit gave them utterance. (Acts 2:1-4)

Sergei Prokofieff described this event as one in which the heavenly flames penetrated through the heads of the apostles and into their hearts. In that way, they were able to speak a special language understandable to every human being, the original language of the heart spoken from soul to soul. Through the spiritual fire in their hearts, the apostles recognized themselves as united in a new community. (*The Whitsun Impulse*)

Greetings from the Auburn, AL Study Group and a brief history

In January 2009 we started with *Theosophy*. We worked for over three years on this book. In 2012 we started with *An Outline of Esoteric Science*. We will finish by the end of summer.

We meet each Thursday at 2 pm till 4 pm. The meeting is opened and closed with a verse by Rudolf Steiner. If one of you travels south, please stop in Auburn. It is always so refreshing to have visitors. We meet in my house. By now we are together nine members and friends.

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Update from the Branch Study Group

To enhance out study group night and to make us more aware of ourselves and our world, we have begun a practice of biographical sharing in the Wednesday night group. We have begun with a focus on the physical: Where were you born? How might the topography of one's childhood influence our adult lives? We are strengthening our relationships as we come to know one another better. Many thanks to Linda Brooks Cooper, who is guiding this activity. Following this exercise, we are continuing our study of Rudolf Steiner's *The Gospel of St. John*.
