A Salute to Black History Month

The Normal School

Did you know that just two hours south of Atlanta, there exists a town called Tuskegee Alabama, and that little city houses one of the oldest Historic Black Colleges in America? It was not always known as Tuskegee Institute however; at its humble beginning it was called the "Negro Normal School in Tuskegee."

What is a normal school, you ask, for in 1896 when the Normal School began it was as a thought for education just for Negroes (as African Americans were commonly known at that time). The Normal School started just that way, a thought; a deal was struck in exchange for votes and the Alabama Legislature appropriated money for the school. There was no land, no buildings, no teachers, only the state-appropriated money. George Campbell, a former slave owner sent to Hampton Institute for a teacher and Booker T. Washington appeared. Destiny, for Washington led the school from 1881 until his death in 1915. The initial space was provided by the Butler Chapel AME Zion--a one-room shanty.

Dr. Washington, who assisted many "Negro Schools" in the south, brought Tuskegee from a "normal school" to a school of independence.


Tuskegee rose to national prominence under the leadership of its founder, Dr. Washington, and it was Dr. Washington who invited George Washington Carver to Tuskegee. Carver became head of the Agriculture Department. Dr. Carver taught at Tuskegee for 47 years, where he developed the Agriculture program into a strong research center. He taught young black students crop rotation and new farming techniques.

George Washington Carver became famous for his work with the peanut. He eventually became the "Peanut Man." In 1920, he spoke at the United Peanut Association of America and from that appearance was invited to speak before the U.S. Congress, where he was a success!

He created many products from peanuts such as milk, dyes, flour and cheese. He even felt that he could cure polio with peanut oil, but no scientific evidence ever showed that it could.

Carver never kept a list of the products he created from peanuts and thus, although he became famous for his work with the peanuts, he was never fully recognized for such work.

The "normal school" became a university, thanks to those who were committed to it and its people: the Church, the Slave Owner, the legislator, the "peanut farmer" and the students who believed in it.
